#### **District Update:**

Mr. Zinni gave an update on the following topics:

- Mask update
- Mask guidelines on school busses

The Wellness Committee met last week to discuss all of the KP Initiatives. Mr. Zinni thanked Mrs. Pearl, Wellness Coordinator of the 4 districts for her expertise and talent to get us through the Pandemic by setting up Covid clinics, flu clinics, distribution of Covid testing and all of the health and wellness tasks going on throughout the community.

Dr. Mobley provided an overview on concurrent enrollment and dual enrollment initiatives and has held 2 town halls for students on course selections. She also explained the difference between AP credits and college credits. Discussion ensued on college initiatives, tuition and costs involved for the various programs being offered at Massasoit Community College, Stonehill College and Assumption. Dr. Mobley will offer more information in her upcoming newsletter on these topics.

Dr. Mobley is working with a KP student participating in the Photonics Program offered at Stonehill College. Mr. Zinni has been asked to serve on the Photonics Board that will meet quarterly. Gilson is working on obtaining grant funding for this program.

Dr. Gilson provided information on the Summer Bridge to KP Program being offered to rising 7<sup>th</sup> graders. KP, Norfolk, Plainville and Wrentham are partnering to offer this program to rising 7<sup>th</sup> grade students to attend a one week summer program to support their transition to KP MS.

# **FY23 Budget Update**

In a memorandum dated March 2, 2022, Mr. Azer outlines the proposed FY23 budget for review and final adoption by the School Committee.

 A Motion was made by Mr. Cates, to adopt a FY2023 total budget (including debt service) of \$38,639,323 with the following town assessments:

Mr. Cates commented that the King Philip presentation of the budget was well received in Plainville. Mr. Zinni will be working with the three town administrators and the towns on the budget process through town meetings for each town.

#### MS Special Education Program Development:

Mr. Zinni indicated that the MS Administration and the Special Education Department is deeply immersed in offering an impeding a new program at the Middle School. This program will assist students who have significant issues on the autism spectrum, based upon applied behavior analysis. The district would like to ensure that there is a very smooth transition for these students coming from the 6<sup>th</sup> grade from the elementary districts who reside in one of the three towns with placement in grade 7 to an in-house program at KP.
