STUDENT COUNCIL REPORT:

HS Student Council Report dated 5/16/2022 was prepared and read into the Minutes by Ms. Lewis.

REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

District Undate:

- -Mr. Zinni commented on the great performance of Legally Blond on Friday night. The performance was well attended and students did an incredible job.
- -Absentecism has been an issue for the district over the last couple of weeks for both staff and students. There has been an uptick due to positive covid cases. Mr. Zinni is hopeful this will be a brief period and then settle back down again.

- -Mr. Zinni mentioned King Philip offers multiple clubs for students to join. If there is not a club already being offered we will try to build it. King Philip offers something for everyone. Dr. Mobley has been known to staff a program herself until the program is up and running.
- Mr. Zinni mentioned we were short staffed for proctoring AP exams. AP Exams are given at the same time each year across the country. These are scheduled over a two week period of time. A large number of staff were needed to cover exams. Mr. Zinni thanked all staff members who helped with this process. There were a total number of 441 students taking 965 AP exams over the two week period. King Philip students outperform the state and the state outperforms the country.
- -Mr. Zinni mentioned the last day for seniors will be May 23, 2022. Graduation day will be on Sunday June 5, 2022 at 3:00pm at Stone Hill College. All committee members are welcome to attend. Please let Mr. Zinni know if you plan on attending so we may reserve enough seats for everyone. A reminder to members, if you plan on attending to arrive about an hour in advance of the graduation time. Each family will receive six tickets. Families may ask for additional tickets if they would like other family members to attend. When we have extra tickets we try to accommodate most requests..

NEW BUSINESS:

Mr. Knott mentioned the committee will often move the date of the school committee meeting the first Monday in June, due to the annual town meetings. Mr. Lehan moved the motion to move the school committee date from Monday, June 6, 2022 to Tuesday, June 7, 2022.

• A Motion was made by Mr. Lehan, seconded by Mr. Cates, to move the Monday, June 6th school committee meeting to Tuesday, June 7th. All in favor: Yes (8); No (0); Abstain (0). Motion carried: 8-0-0. (Sarah Ward not present for vote)

Mr. Zinni gave an update on the Norfolk Town Meeting which was held last Tuesday. Mr Zinni and Dr. Allardi, Norfolk Superintendent, gave a combined presentation part 1 and part 2 of the Norfolk education budget. The budget was passed unanimously.

Mr. Azer, will join the Plainville Town Meeting to assist with any questions which may come up. Mr Zinni will join the Wrentham Town Meeting.

Mr. Knott asked Mr. Zinni to walk committee members through the superintendent's evaluation process.

Mr. Zinni reminded members that there is a policy that states committee members need to be on the committee at least one year before completing the evaluation. Six members will be asked to complete this year. Evaluation is made up of two parts.

<u>Part 1</u>: Set of Goals-These were approved back in the fall by the committee. Mr. Zinni reports on how much of the goals have been accomplished. Some goals will run more than one year and some completed in one year.

<u>Part 2</u>: Four standards with a number of indicators under those standards. The indicators are sometimes redundant and there are multiple indicators for each standard. When Mr. Zinni arrived in the district, the committee picked out about ten power indicators that seemed to summarize each of those standards and had chosen those as representing the total tool.

Mr. Zinni has taken those goals and the indicators and has provided bullet points of evidence of his ability to have met those standards and meet those goals. The rubric that the committee is evaluating Mr. Zinni on is a four point rubric: Unsatisfactory, Needs Improvement, Proficient, and Exemplary.

Ms. Petit will provide members with a document, put together by the Massachusetts Association of School Committee, which will summarize how to evaluate the superintendent and within that will be the rubric. Mr. Bois and Ms. Petit will work on a google form which members will enter in their rating information. This document will be sent out to members this week. The google document will pull all information together and will summarize this information. Mr. Zinni also reminded members it takes awhile to go through this process. Members were asked to get this form back to Mr. Knott by the next school committee date of June 7. If members need a little bit more time to complete this process, please inform Mr. Knott.

Mr. Cates reminded members this is a process that members need to give some thought to and is an important function of the school committee. Mr. Knott reminded members they are responsible for overseeing the superintendent and for being stewards of the budget. Goals don't change much from year to year while each year more and more progress is made against each goal. This year is the third year of a five year strategic plan.

Mr. Zinni reminded members this was for a one year evaluation. (July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022) Schools look a lot different than they did last fall. This school year was opened in a pandemic. Mr. Zinni is proud of how the district has moved through the pandemic.

Mr. Zinni presented the Metro West Health Adolescent Survey Results Spring 2022 (see slide presentation). This survey usually is given every two years but due to the pandemic it has been three years since the last survey. This survey is given throughout the state and nationally and is very well written. This is a summary only. Mr. Zinni has received about 20 different pieces of data and more to come. This data is used with our curriculum and instruction, health and wellness curriculum and Healthy KP. Study is given to grades 7 -12. Mr. Zinni provided members with a summary.

Mr. Zinni mentioned that we have to make our schools a safe place and help students and staff with resources if they are struggling with mental health issues. Mr. Lehan would like to make mental health a topic of discussion at the school committee retreat.

Mr. Cates commented that this is not only a school issue but a community issue.

Mr. Knott clarified these results of this survey are not directly shared with students but instead a social norms campaign is run.

Mr. Zinni reported that there are a lot of vehicles that will be used over the next year to get this information out. We are also looking at adding more health teachers to our program. Mr. Zinni presented the Metro West Data and the slides are included as an attachment.

Mr. Waxman would like to see this information tied to the diversity, equity and inclusion work and believes it would be relevant and would like to see this discussion included in the retreat in August..

Retreat Dates/Location-

Mr. Knott mentioned the date for the school committee retreat will be held on Monday, August 1, 2022. This will be a half day retreat. This date looks good for everyone except Sarah Ward. Location of this year's retreat will be announced at a later date.

around town hall. Jennifer Parson has been selected to fill the Superintendent position. Negotiations are beginning. School choice hearing was a no vote. School committee budget was voted in. There will also be another budget that will be presented by the finance committee associated with the number of articles.

-Wrentham School Committee Representative: Ms. Greaney reported an Assistant Principal has been hired replacing Robert Worth;

School Wide

Olivia LaFond - STEM

• Creation of a Website for the Wrentham Food Pantry

Olivia worked with the directors of the Wrentham Food Pantry to develop a website that provides easy access to information for both volunteers and patrons.

Sheela Pandit - STEM

 Promoting Interest in Artificial Intelligence Among Elementary-School Aged Children

Sheela developed several games that were placed in the Norfolk Library that teach young children about the "thought" processes incorporated into artificial intelligence programming.

Cinema and Ideology



Goal:

Increase student attendance so that gaps in learning are decreased, and social-emotional supports are increased to build a solid foundation for post-secondary opportunities.

Definition of Chronic Absenteeism:

Chronic absenteeism, a primary cause of poor academic achievement, is defined as missing at least 10 percent of days in a school year (18) for any reason, including excused and unexcused absences.

Data:

307 Students out of 1190 were chronically absent as of 5/19/22

43 Students out of 308 would be affected by this policy

5 Students with 58 or more absences dropped out of school

On average students with less than 20 absences passed all classes

Chronic Absenteeism Link

KPHS Proposed Grading protocol related to chronic absenteeism

A student may receive a grade of NC-- no credit if they miss a total of 10 class periods in a term, including excused or unexcused absences in a class that meets six times per cycle. For the purposes of this protocol, disciplinary suspension/removals do not count as absences.

Teachers will notify school counselors and administrators of attendance concerns, and the building-based support team will meet before issuing an NC grade. If there are extenuating circumstances presented to the student's principal or designee, they may allow the student to receive credit for the term. This determination may be appealed to the principal or their designee within ten (10) school days of the posting of the NC grade. Upon appeal, the principal or their designee will consider whether the absences were caused by a documented disability or documented health condition.

In the event that a student loses credit due to absences, there is still a possibility of earning a final grade in the course.

If a student receives 1 NC in an Advanced Placement course, the student Building Based Support Team will meet to determine whether the student can continue in the course or will need to move to an honors or standard course.

If a student receives 2 NCs at any time in a year-long course, the student Building Based Support Team will meet to determine whether the student can continue in the course.

If a student receives 1 NC at any time in a semester-long course, the student will receive an NC for a final grade and will not receive credit for the course.

- 1 N results in a loss of 25% of the course credit in a year-long course and 50% loss of credit in a semester-long course.
- 2 Ns results in a loss of 50% of the course credit in a year-long course and full loss of credit in a semester-long course.
- 3 NCs at any time in a year-long course, the student will receive an NC for a final grade and will
 not receive credit for the course.

Students will have the opportunity for credit recovery in the subject area if it is a core subject or in the case of an elective course in an elective of their choice.

Students losing credit in a course will be placed in an Academic Support Class to assist with the recovery process. Nothing in this protocol should be construed to override or supersede the school district's obligation to comply with Section 504 or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act in regard to individual students covered by those statutes.

FY 2023 LUNCH PRICES

Pursuant to the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-296), school districts must provide the same level of support for lunches served to students who are not eligible for free or reduced priced lunches (i.e., paid lunches) as they are for lunches served to students eligible for free or reduced lunches.

An annual review of paid meal prices must be conducted and reported to be in compliance with the equity in meal pricing provision of this law. For the 2022-23 school year, the weighted average price of paid meals must be equal to or greater than \$3.31 per meal.

Districts already charging more than \$3.31 do not need to make a change; districts charging less than that need to either increase the price or provide additional non-federal support for paid lunches (i.e., from the general fund budget). Our current price of \$3.25 per lunch is below the weighted average, therefore action is required.

Additionally, since prices were last raised three years ago (for the 2019-20 school year) – during which we also experienced a once-in-a century global pandemic – the cost of food, supplies, maintenance, and labor have risen.

Therefore, we are recommending the following increases to the prices of student lunch and breakfast, as well as adult lunch and breakfast.

Motion:

To approve the following price increases for the 2022-2023 school year:

Student Lunch

from \$3.25 to \$3.50

Student Breakfast

from \$1.75 to \$2.00

Adult Lunch

from \$4.50 to \$5.00

Adult Breakfast

from \$2.75 to \$3.00
