## Norfolk Temporary Respite Shelter Update

As you know, on May 19th the state announced the Norfolk Temporary Respite Center would be closing as of July 31, 2025. This past month we saw a significant decrease in students residing at the Norfolk shelter, as most families from the Norfolk shelter with students in our schools have secured housing in other locations. Most of these students' families have understandably decided to keep their children in our schools to close out this 2024-2025 school year. We expect most of these students to be unenrolled from our King Philip Regional School District by the start of the 2025-2026 school year, because most of these students' families have secured more permanent housing located outside of our tri-town area. Any students remaining at the shelter as of July 31st will most likely be moved to a shelter in Lowell - these students would still be considered homeless (McKinney-Vento) and would have the right to attend our schools in the fall; however, they would most likely switch schools to Lowell, as the commute from Lowell to Norfolk or Wrentham is too long.

# **Spring Tri-Town Meetings**

On May 14th I presented an overview of our King Philip Regional School District FY26 budget at the Norfolk Spring Town Meeting and their FY26 town budget was unanimously approved. On May 19th I attended the Plainville Spring Town Meeting and their budget was passed by a large majority (just two in opposition). And on June 2nd I attended the Wrentham Spring Town Meeting and their FY26 budget was unanimously passed.


## **Dot Pearl YMCA Award**

The fellowship includes the foundation's month-long Summer Institute at Georgetown and Marymount University in Washington, D.C. This is the 39th year of the Graduate Fellowship's existence. Its mission is to improve the teaching of the U.S. Constitution in secondary schools throughout the nation.
